Course description: This course provides an introduction to the work of William Shakespeare. We will be reading a variety of plays and a selection of his poetry. Students will be introduced to basic close reading skills for poetry and drama. We will examine the plays as literary texts, as well as performance texts.

Texts and readings:

Stephen Greenblatt et al, eds, The Norton Shakespeare: Essential Plays and The Sonnets, 3rd Edition (New York: W W Norton, 2016).

Assignments and Evaluation:

Mid-term test: 20%

First essay assignment (1200 words): 20%

Second essay assignment (1500 words): 30%

Final exam (Scheduled by the Registrar's Office): 30%

Note: to complete the first assignment you will need to attend a performance of Julius Caesar by the Shakespeare Company at Vertigo Theatre. Performances run September 21 – October 7. There is a special admission rate of \$20; preview performances cost \$15..

There is a registrar scheduled examination in this course, in the examination period (December, 2017). This is a closed book exam. Students must be available for examinations up to the last day of the examination period.

Please note that students are not required to submit or pass any specific assignment or test in this

course in order to qualify for a passing grade.

Assignments must be submitted in class; electronic submissions are not permitted without prior permission from the instructor.

Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized (e.g. with the loss of a third of a grade for each day [(not class)] that the assignment is overdue).

Note: Please make all efforts to take assignments directly to the instructor. If it is not possible to do so, take your assignment to SS1152 and place it in the drop-box. Your assignment will then be date-stamped and placed in your instructor's mailbox. Please keep a copy of your assignment in case of loss by any cause. Assignments cannot be returned by staff in the Department office.

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:
 - (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
 - (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
 - (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
 - (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
