Course description: An examination of the claims and assumptions of a range of contemporary critical practices, such as formalism, structuralism, deconstruction, feminism and gender studies, new historicism, psychoanalytic criticism, and cultural and ideological critique. Includes practice in the application of theory to literary texts.

Prerequisite(s): One full-course equivalent of English and/or Comparative Literature, or consent of the Department.

Notes: Compulsory for English Majors, Minors and Honors students.

Texts and readings:

Three books are required. They are:

Derrida, Jacques. Limited Inc (Evanston, IL: Northwestern UP, 1988).

Foucault, Michel. The Archaeology of Knowledge (New York: Random House, 1982)

Parker, Robert Dale, ed. Critical Theory: A Reader for Literary and Cultural Studies (New York: Oxford UP, 2012) (*note: we will use the Parker anthology first, starting in week two of the course*)

There will also be additional readings that can be accessed via the Taylor Family Digital Library electronic holdings or via other web resources – please see week-by-week schedule for further information.

It is expected that students will come to each class having completed the readings assigned for that date as per the schedule posted to Blackboard

Use of Electronic Devices:

Students are welcome to use laptops and other electronic devices in support of learning and for specific instructor-led tasks in the classroom. Any student found to be using a device for non-academic purposes will be asked to switch off that device and stow it away from their desk (e.g. in a backpack).

Assignments and Evaluation:

4 keyword/concept tests written in class time (2 each term) @ 10% each

2 short papers (1000 words per paper) @ 15 % each (due dates in November 2013 and January 2014) Final essay (3000 words) @ 30% (due in April 2014)

The two short papers and final essay must be submitted as print copy (no electronic submissions will be accepted). Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+) for each business day [not class] that the assignment is overdue. Please make every effort to take

assignments directly to the instructor. If it is not possible to do so, take your assignment to SS 1152 and put it in the dropbox. Your assignment will be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox. It is your responsibility to keep a copy of all assignments in case of loss by any cause. Assignments cannot be returned by staff in the Department office.

There will be no Registrar scheduled final exam in this course.

Grading system:

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

- 1. Plagiarism Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:
- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
