Course description:

An examination of contemporary critical and cultural theories and their practical applications to reading. Students will learn models of critical reading and gain experience applying them to a variety of literary and cultural texts. We will be gradually reading *Frankenstein* (1818 version) by Mary Shelley, alongside classic texts of literary theory and criticism on the novel, to develop your ability to think about literature in ways informed and influenced by contemporary literary theory.

Antirequisite: Credit for ENGL 303 and 302 will not be allowed. Students with prior credit in ENGL 302 will not be allowed to take 303. Students are permitted to take ENGL 303 prior to 302.

Assignments and evaluation:

Paper 1: 25% (c. 1500 words plus works cited) Paper 2: 25% (c. 1500 words plus works cited) 6 reading quizzes (the top five scores count): 15%

Final exam: 35%

The two papers will ask you to analyze a specified literary text—not *Frankenstein*—through the theory we have been reading together. Successful papers will analyze the details of the text closely and work through the theory in its particulars, to arrive at innovative readings of literary texts.

Papers are to be submitted in hard copy at the beginning of class time on the due date. Late papers should be submitted to the instructor by email. Papers submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+) for each day (not class) that the assignment is overdue, including weekend days. No assignments will be accepted one week past the assignment deadline without the prior consent of the instructor.

Reading quizzes (15%) will be given on a surprise basis during the first five minutes of some classes. Expect six of them throughout the semester. These quizzes will test basic facts about the text we are set to discuss, so as to persuade (or inspire) you to keep up with our reading load, and thus with discussion. Late arrival to class or absence will result in a grade of zero. Your lowest quiz score will be dropped, to mitigate the effects if you happen to use one of your allowed absences on a day we have a quiz.

There are no extra credit opportunities available in this course. Students need not complete all assignments, or any particular assignment, to receive a passing grade for the course.

Grading system:

Quizzes will receive a numerical grade. Essays will be graded on a letter-grade basis, which will then be converted to a percentage for the purposes of calculating grades. As per the Department of English standard, the following conversion scale is used.

Although the A+ is solely an honorific that entails no additional points in the four-point system, the course instructor will employ this mark to distinguish superlative work that exceeds expectations in style, correctness, intellectual depth and breadth, sophistication, and originality.

Remember that your job is to jump into our discussion, not to transcribe it. Although students are not forbidden the use of a laptop in class for note-taking purposes, I strongly encourage you to take notes by hand instead, given research that shows that notes taken by hand significantly improve student learning (e.g., Mueller and Oppenheimer, 2014). PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

- 1. Plagiarism Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:
- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,

(d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.
