ENGL364 Lec 01 Poetry Writing I

Course description:

English 364 is a workshop in writing poetry. The objective of the course is to give students a practical grounding in the techniques of writing contemporary poetry, while exploring the various possible ways poets engage with language, the world and the self.

The course is conducted on the seminar/workshop model, featuring discussion and evaluation of each student's creative writing by his or her peers as well as by the instructor. Students will be expected to be actively writing and submitting their creative work throughout the course. In addition, students will make occasional presentations on published poetry and criticism, and we will also be conducting discussions, exercises and experiments on various aspects of craft. Students will be expected to attend local public readings outside class time.

Assignments and Evaluation:

Students should come to this class prepared for rigorous reading and writing. Grades will be based on the quality of the writing, ability to critique and participate in class discussions, and on formal presentations. Your final grade will consist of an evaluation of all the work you do in the course, including your attendance, participation, presentations and the degree of improvement you make. You are expected to attend and to contribute to class discussion. Below is a breakdown of how the final grade is determined. You will be given feedback throughout the year, and you may not skip any component of the grade requirements.

Writing Component of Final Grade (60%)

A final manuscript of poetry must be handed in no later than the final class. This will be polished (which means re-written, not first draft) writing, based on the work critiqued in installments over the duration of the course. This manuscript will be judged according to the amount of work accomplished, the progress in realizing objectives, and evidence of the student's grasp of the principles and techniques involved in writing poetry. The manuscript must be accompanied by a two to three page process statement (which you will do drafts of throughout the year) describing

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your own analysis of your progress during the year, difficulties encountered, difficulties remaining, and objectives for the future. This manuscript, with accompanying process statement, is worth 60% of the final grade.

All work must be typed and double-spaced in a legible font, no smaller than 12 point (with allowances for page and type design of poems).

Participation (including attendance) (10%)

In order to receive full marks for the Participation component of the final grade, students must arrive punctually, attend class and participate in class discussion. Five percent of your participation mark will be deducted for each class missed without a medical or other valid reason.

Critiques (10%)

Students will be expected to read carefully and respond usefully in writing to each other's work. Development of critical skills, the ability to suggest ways to improve and generate more work for others is an important component of this workshop, because it usually precedes the capacity to apply these same skills to one's own work. Students are also required to provide two copies of a one paragraph to one page long, double-spaced written commentary for each submission critiqued (one for the instructor and one for the student whose work is being discussed). These critiques are due on the evening of the class discussion. Students will also present one detailed critique of another student's work in class.

In-class Presentations (10%)

Students will also be expected to read assigned texts of published poetry and criticism and comment on them. Each student will make at least two presentations on assigned texts. Following the discussion, the student will write up his or her presentation and hand in to instructor.

Writing Exercises (5%)

In addition, a number of writing exercises will be assigned. These exercises are intended to generate work, practice fundamental techniques and explore the possibilities of poetic practice. These will not be graded, but marks will be deducted if the exercises are not completed.

Journal (3%)

You will also be responsible for maintaining a writer's journal throughout the year, which will be periodically checked by the instructor. Grades will be awarded for completion of the assigned entries.

Reading Reviews (2%)

Readings and other literary events provide students with exposure to the writing community and performance techniques. Students will be expected to attend a minimum of one external and/or departmental readings each term and comment on them. Students will hand in a one-page, typed, double-spaced report on the reading or event. The first report is due by the last class of the Fall semester; the remaining report is due by the last class of the Winter semester.

End of Year Reading and Class Chapbook

At the end of the Academic year, all the Creative Writing classes hold a mass evening reading. To celebrate that event, each class puts together a chapbook which they sell, and which gives every student who submits a publishing credit. If you are interested in editing or designing, you can choose to be a part of the team that puts the class chapbook together. Those who do that work will have their contribution counted with positive prejudice toward their class participation grade.

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Students must complete **ALL** assignments in order to pass the course. There is **NO** final exam in this course.

E-mail and electronic submissions policy:

Assignments and course work must be submitted in class, on the due date and in printed form, unless other specific arrangements have been made. In particular, submitting work by e-mail without prior agreement is not an acceptable alternative to handing in work on time, in class.

Note: Please make all efforts to take assignments directly to the instructor. If it is not possible to do so, take your assignment to SS1152 and place it in the drop-box. Y our assignment will then be date-stamped and placed in your instructor's mailbox. Please keep a copy of your assignment in case of loss by any cause. Assignments cannot be returned by staff in the Department office.

Grading system:

Policy on late assignments:

All written assignments must be submitted in hard copy. Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+) for each day [not class] that the assignment is overdue, unless a written proof of medical reasons is provided. Please note that students must complete all assignments within 30 days of the end of term in order to qualify for a passing grade in the course.

Plagiarism:

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possible suspension or expulsion from the university. 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PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

- 1. **Plagiarism** Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:
- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
