### ENGLISH 387.05-02 COURSE TITLE: LITERATURE AND THE NEWS

WINTER 2013

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#### **Course Description**

This course will consider the generic and epistemological distinctions between "literature" and "the news," how those distinctions have historically been maintained, and cases where those distinctions have been challenged. Two important Anglo-American modernist poets, for instance, offered rather different opinions on the relationship between literature and the news: Ezra Pound wrote that "Literature is news that stays news" in *ABC of Reading*, while William Carlos Williams wrote, in his poem "Asphodel, That Greeny Flower," "It is difficult / to get the news from poems / yet men die miserably every day / for lack / of what is found there." Some questions we will consider in this course include: how might the journalism of writers such as Ernest Hemingway or Mark Twain relate stylistically to their more "literary" writing? How might journalistic genres such as obituary relate to literary genres such as elegy? At what point do the distinctions between literature and journalism begin to break down, as in a text like Truman Capote's *In Cold Blood*? How do poets and fiction writers incorporate elements of the news into their work? The course will include instruction in close textual analysis and the writing of undergraduate papers in English.

There is no Registered-scheduled final exam in this course.

Participation will be a measure of your attendance, preparation, and contributions to class discussion. The short paper will be assigned early in term and you will have a choice of topics, but it will involve some comparison of a journalistic and a literary text. The group presentations will be given by groups of 2-4 students on a general topic leading in to our discussion of the topic; please see the course schedule for available topics. The group presentation will be 20-25 minutes in length, plus questions, and you should submit a written version of the presentation to the instructor (though you will only be evaluated on the oral presentation). The midterm and final tests will be in-class; further details on the tests will be given in class. The research paper will be on one of the major works we study; 5% of the 35% will be for either an abstract of the paper or an annotated bibliography that will be submitted a week before the paper is due.

No extra-credit assignments will be given in this course. You do not have to complete all assignments to receive a passing grade in this course. There is no registrar-scheduled final exam in this course. Assignments should be submitted in class on the day they are due, or else to the English department drop box. Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized (with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+) for each business day [not class] that the assignment is overdue.

# PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

(a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),

(b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,

(c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,

(d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.
