

# DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH English 517-S01 Towards a Genealogy of Minoritarian Writing WINTER 2023 Tuesdays, 1:00-3:45; web-based

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Office Hours:	Mon. 11:00-noon and by appointment (Zoom)

### **Course description:**

This course explores the idea of minoritarian writing as variously named and practiced in contemporary theory and literature. A minor literature, according to Deleuze and Guattari, is not literature written in a minor language; "it is rather that which a minority constructs within a major language." Its three defining characteristics are "the deterritorialization of language, the connection of the individual to a political immediacy, and the collective assemblage of enunciation." To borrow terms from Nietzsche, minoritarian writing is an "untimely" style of writing, which "act[s] counter to our time and thereby act[s] on our time ... for the benefit of a time to come." The seminar discussions will center around the following questions: What are the central concerns shared among various forms of contemporary minoritarian writing? In what sense is minoritarian writing a revolutionary force? Why is it that a minor literature always opens up a new way of imagining or experiencing aesthetic, cultural, and epistemological otherness? To what extent might a minor literature deterritorialize dominant language and social imaginaries in a way that is really heterogeneous or external to the rule of neoliberal capitalism? What role can minoritarian writing play in transforming the English classroom into a vibrant space of production of creative energies and ideas?

Course Hours: 3 units (3S-0) Prerequisite(s): 6 units of English at the 400-level

# **Course Learning Outcomes:**

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to 1. Acquire an enlightened and enriched understanding of what is called minor literature and the central concerns and features shared among various forms of contemporary minority writing. 2. Add to their conceptual toolbox a number of useful critical concepts such as assemblage, deterritorialization, lines of flight/escape, minoritarian, rhizome, and parrhēsia. **3**. Achieve increased familiarity with different articulations of aesthetic, cultural, and epistemological otherness.

4. Become more insightful, rigorous, creative readers of literary and theoretical texts, making new, unexpected connections.

5. Construct engaging, thought-provoking arguments based on productive research and original interpretations of texts framed with innovative methodological and critical concepts.6. Initiate and participate in a productive seminar discussion of a literary or critical text.

There is no Registrar-scheduled final examination in the course.

Students must submit all assignments to qualify for a passing grade. Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+) per day. No assignments will be accepted one week past the assignment deadline without the prior consent of the instructor.

Students are required to submit written assignments electronically. There are D2L dropbox folders for various assignments.

All take-home essays, with 1" margins and double-spaced throughout, adhere to the format and documentation outlined in the *MLA Handbook* (9<sup>th</sup> Edition). To avoid plagiarism, please read the attached statement on plagiarism.

Class participation is expected from every student. I will take attendance on a regular basis. To be awarded an A, the student must always make insightful, constructive contributions to seminar discussion, considerably advancing the level and depth of the conversation. To be awarded an A-, the student needs to play an active role in seminar discussion, often advancing the level and depth of the conversation. To be awarded a B, the student needs to be well prepared for seminar discussion and makes relevant and constructive responses to questions and issues under discussion. Receiving a C means that the student participates in seminar discussion, and when responding to questions and issues under discussion only makes general and vague remarks.

I will try my best to respond to your emails in a timely manner, but I will only reply to brief inquires and won't be able to discuss any matter in detail by email. If you wish to discuss course material or essay assignments, you need to make a Zoom meeting appointment during my office hour.

# **Guidelines for Zoom Sessions:**

This course will take place online via Desire2Learn (D2L) and Zoom. To best succeed in the course, students are encouraged to participate in the asynchronous learning tasks using the D2L learning environment and synchronous Zoom sessions. When unable to participate live due to the time difference or unforeseen circumstances, inform the instructor in advance and propose and implement propose an alternative participation activity (e.g., watch the recordings, submit a brief reflection, and actively contribute to the follow-up online discussion).

There will be 13 synchronous Zoom sessions throughout the term.

Zoom is a video conferencing program that will allow us to meet at specific times for a "live" video conference, so that we can have the opportunity to meet each other virtually and discuss relevant course topics as a learning community.

To help ensure Zoom sessions are private, do not share the Zoom link or password with others, or on any social media platforms. Zoom links and passwords are only intended for students registered in the course. Zoom recordings and materials presented in Zoom, including any teaching materials, must not be shared, distributed or published without the instructor's permission.

The use of video conferencing programs relies on participants to act ethically, honestly and with integrity; and in accordance with the principles of fairness, good faith, and respect (as per the <u>Code of Conduct</u>). There is no D- grade.
