Course description:

This course explores the book arts -- papermaking, letterpress printing, relief illustration, and bookbinding -- as they were practiced during the hand-press period (1500-1800). The course will rely on experiential and object-centred modes of inquiry. Some of our sessions will be held in the Department's new Book Arts Lab.

Course learning outcomes:

- To identify and to describe using correct terminology the principal features of handpress books
- To evaluate how "making" is a form of "knowing" early printed books
- To evaluate how a knowledge of the materiality of the hand-press book may inform our understanding of book-making processes across time

Texts and readings:

Course textbook: Sarah Werner *Studying Early Printed Books 1450-1800* (available at the campus bookstore). Other texts available through the course D2L site.

Learning technology requirements:

- There are no particular assessments that must be completed to qualify for a passing mark in this course; however, failure to complete all assignments and tests may result in a failing grade in the course.
- Late assignments will be penalized at the rate of 5% per date of lateness including weekends. Late assignments may not be accepted after three days without previous permission of the instructor.
- The quality of your writing will be an important factor in the evaluation of written course assessments

Reaching Me:
