Course Description

This course explores Foucault's discourse on *parrhēsia* (free-spokenness or truth-telling) through the lens of works by Giorgio Agamben, Alain Badiou, Judith Butler, David Harvey, Emmanuel Levinas, Jacques Rancière, and Slavoj Žižek. In *The Courage of* Truth Foucault defines the parrhēsiast (truth-speaker) as "the unlimited, permanent, unbearable questioner," someone who takes truth-speaking as his/her uncompromised "duty, obligation, and responsibility," although it may involve a risk concerning his/her relationship with the person or society to which the truth is presented. In Foucault's view, truth as such "can never be the same; there can be truth only in the form of the other world and the other life." That is, to speak truth in the Platonic or Cynic manner is to open up an other perspective on the present world, to imagine an alternative world from that other perspective. In this course, students will make a systematic inquiry into Foucault's notion of parrhēsia as developed in the two volumes of his lectures delivered at Collège de France from 1982-1983 and from 1983-1984. The seminar readings and discussions will be structured along the following questions: In what senses do the theorists and critics read on the course measure up to Foucault's definition of parrhēsiast? What other perspectives on the world and what other ways of being human do they open up in their writings? How does the Foucauldian parrhēsiast or parrhēsia contribute to renewing our notion of the role of literature and criticism, as well as broadening our horizon of critical thinking?

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

- 1. Plagiarism Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:
- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
