## **Course Description**

One of the most significant events in the age of globalization is the emerging of all kinds of marginality striving for recognition. What this means is that all nations, ethnic communities, or social or political solidarities are claiming their legitimate share in the symbolic and political domains of representation. It is in this global context that the problem of the relationship between translation and the politics of universality is being increasingly foregrounded. This course provides a space for a systematic investigation of the relationship between translation and the articulation of the universal. The seminar readings and discussions will be structured along the following questions: How does translation foreground different ways of being human? What role does translation play in negotiations on the universal among different cultures? How to translate the universal across linguistic or cultural boundaries to the satisfaction of all concerned? How to articulate the universal by way of cultural or cross-cultural translation so that different peoples and ethnic communities are equally represented in the concept of universality?

Each student will make a seminar presentation. The written assignments will be a review essay of 1500 words and a research paper of 5000 words.

Students must submit all assignments to qualify for a passing grade. All take-home written assignments must be typewritten and double-spaced. You should use a 12 point type-size and a readable font. Take-home essays must adhere to the format and documentation outlined in the *MLA Handbook* (7<sup>th</sup> Edition).

Please keep a copy of everything you submit. Except in cases of illness or crisis, late papers will be penalized a fraction of a grade per day (i.e., an A paper handed in a day late will receive an A-; an A paper handed in two days late will receive a B+).

I do not accept students' work by email except in cases of real emergency, but then an identical hard copy needs to be submitted later on.

### **PLAGIARISM**

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

- 1. Plagiarism Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:
- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
