<u>Course description</u>: In this introduction to the plays and poems of William Shakespeare, students will gain an understanding of Shakespeare as a product and producer of early modern culture. We will also look at his continuing presence in contemporary world culture. The class will pay particular attention to how we, as twenty-first readers and viewers, engage Shakespeare's plays and poems and how the playwright's work is mediated by the various forms of transmission (print texts, electronic texts, the stage, on film).

# Texts and readings:

We will study three plays in detail: As You Like It, Richard III and Othello. You <u>must</u> purchase the following editions (in stock at the University of Calgary Bookstore):

As You Like It (ed. David Bevington), published by Broadview Press in 2012. Richard III (Norton Critical Edition, ed. Thomas Cartelli), published in 2008.

Othello (Folger Shakespeare Library, ed. Barbara Mowat and Paul Werstine), published in 2004.

We will also study a selection of Shakespeare's sonnets and these will be accessed online: www.opensourceshakespeare.org/views/sonnets/sonnets.php

#### Course (lecture and tutorial) schedule:

This will be posted electronically on the class D2L site ahead of the first class. Students must review the schedule carefully and make sure that readings are completed ahead of the lecture or tutorial where the material will be discussed.

#### Use of Electronic Devices:

Students are welcome to use laptops and other electronic devices in support of learning and for specific instructor-led tasks in the classroom. Any student found to be using a device for non-academic purposes will be asked to switch off that device and stow it away from their desk (e.g. in a backpack).

## Assignments and Evaluation:

In-class tests (two, each worth 15%) – the tests will ask short content questions as well as for a detailed analysis of a key scene or passage from a play.

Written papers (two, each worth 20%) – the papers will take up topics raised in editors' introductions to the play texts and thus it is essential that you have the particular edition of the play as detailed above. Each paper will be about 1000 words in length.

There will be a registrar-scheduled final exam (worth 30%): this will involve short questions about the plays and sonnets studied and a longer passage analysis (choice of one passage from a selection of three). The examination period for Fall courses runs December 12-22 and students must be available for examinations up to the last day of the examination period.

No books or notes can be used in the in-class tests or the final exam.

If you are absent from the in-class tests or late with assignments for medical reasons, a medical certificate will be required to confirm the absence/delay for health reasons. Please see section E.3 Attendance in the Calendar for further information.

# Assignment Submission and Late Assignment Policy:

Pay careful attention to the instructions on each assignment sheet. Papers will be handed to the instructor at the end of the Tuesday lecture or to the tutorial leader at the end of the Thursday class, according to the due date of the assignment; electronic submissions will not be accepted.

Late assignments will be penalized at a rate of one third of a letter grade per day of lateness (including Saturdays and Sundays). If a paper is handed a day late, for example, a B essay will have the grade reduced to B-. Late submissions may be dropped off at the Dept. of English office or to the Department's dropbox (outside the 11<sup>th</sup> floor office). They will be date-stamped and place in the relevant mailbox.

It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of all assignments in case of loss by any cause.

#### **PLAGIARISM**

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

- 1. Plagiarism Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:
- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
