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Office hours: MW 11am-12pm and by appointment

Course description:

This course will introduce students to a wide variety of contemporary poetry. (For our purposes, "contemporary" means from approximately the last fifty years.) I anticipate that our discussions will include, but not be limited to, the following topics as they intersect with the concerns of the poems we study: form, voice, narrative, gender, culture, class, sexuality. In addition to the required text, The Norton Anthology of Modern and Contemporary Poetry, 3rd Edition, we will make use of audio and video resources available on the websites PennSound, UbuWeb, and Poetry Foundation. During this course students will develop their abilities to read attentively and to make coherent, creative arguments. Evaluation will be based on three "position papers" (explained in more detail below), a group presentation, five surprise in-class writing assignments, and overall class participation.

Required Texts:

The Norton Anthology of Modern and Contemporary Poetry, 3rd Edition. (Editors Jahan Ramazani, Richard Ellmann, Robert O'Clair)

There will be no Registrar-scheduled exam for this course. All written assignments must be completed to qualify for a passing grade.

About Position Papers:

Like an essay, a position paper presents **an argument** as well as a detailed **analysis** of a poem or several poems. However, unlike an essay, position papers do not include lengthy introductions and conclusions. Furthermore, there is no set limit to the number of points you may discuss (i.e. you are not required to make three points as in the classic high school essay.) A position paper includes: a) your argument

explained in one or a few sentences (this is your **thesis statement**,) b) an analysis of the poem, which makes one or several points, and c) a brief conclusion, which may be just one or a few sentences long.

About Surprise Writing Assignments:

Five times during the semester, you will be asked to complete during class time a written answer to a question about that day's assigned reading or a related topic. This assignment will be handed in for evaluation at the end of class. You might consider these the equivalent of "pop quizzes." These assignments will be graded out of 3, corresponding to the 3% of your total grade each one is worth. You will receive a 1/3 for completion, 2/3 for adequate argument and analysis, 3/3 for strong argument and analysis.

About Group Presentations:

Working in groups of three or four, you will be responsible for presenting to the class on an assigned reading. Presentations can take many forms. You may present historical and contextual material on our reading, offer your own analysis of the text(s), ask questions to the class and facilitate discussion, design a group activity, or combine several of these things. Student-led presentations should last about twenty minutes. I will pass around a sign-up sheet at the beginning of the second week of class so that you and your partners may choose the reading and the date you wish to present on.

Submission of Assignments:

Assignments should be submitted in hardcopy, in person, in class, the day they are due. If this is not possible, you may deliver your assignment to the English Department Office in Social Sciences 1152 and put it in the drop box, where your work will be date-stamped and placed in my mailbox. Assignments may not be delivered by email except with prior permission requested at least 3 days before the assignment is due.

Late Assignments:

Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized (e.g. with the loss of a third of a grade (an Ato B+) for each day [not class] that the assignment is overdue OR "each business day"). Class presentations and surprise writing assignments may not be completed late.

Plagiarism:

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possible suspension or expulsion from the university. PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

- 1. **Plagiarism** Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:
- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
