Course description: This section of English 399 will be an introduction to the major periods and styles of detective fiction and to its most iconic writers and detectives, from Edgar Allan Poe and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle to Ian Rankin, with particular attention to Conan Doyle's classic detective Sherlock Holmes, Dorothy L. Sayers's Golden Age detective Lord Peter Wimsey, the hard-boiled American detective in Raymond Chandler, and Ian Rankin's late 20th century Edinburgh detective John Rebus.

Texts and readings:

Only Ian Rankin's *Knots and Crosses* (Orion) needs to be purchased at the Bookstore. The bulk of the readings are provided as an online Coursepack in PDF files on the D2L site, and may also be purchased at the Bookstore in the form of a spiral-bound Coursepack (print-on-demand after the first few copies, ask at the information desk). The following are the novels we will be reading from the Coursepack:

Arthur Conan Doyle, *A Study in Scarlet* (extract)

Arthur Conan Doyle, *The Hound of the Baskervilles*

Dorothy L. Sayers, *Whose Body?*

Raymond Chandler, *The Big Sleep*

In addition, we will read a selection of short detective fiction from the Coursepack. Most of the texts in the Coursepack have handy footnotes that I have added glossing unfamiliar terms, so please use them rather than random texts you may find on the Internet.

Assignments and Evaluation:

Reading tests 45%

Four in-class tests will be based on assigned readings. The three top scores will be averaged for each student to determine the reading test total score, in other words they are worth 15% of the course grade each but the lowest score gets dropped. These multiple-choice tests will be easily passed by students who have attentively done the reading as required.

Book review 25%

Each student will submit an approximately 750 word review of a recently-published detective novel. Further details will be provided on an assignment sheet to be distributed the fifth week of classes. Marking standards will be outlined on a rubric distributed at that time.

Registrar-scheduled Final Examination 30%

The final examination will test your knowledge of the course readings and your ability to write persuasively about them. There will be a short-answer section and an essay section. Students must be available for examinations up to the last day of the examination period, April 16 - 26.

Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (an A- to B+ and so on) for each day (not class) that the assignment is overdue.

There are no extra-credit assignments.

Students do not need to complete all assignments in order to receive a passing grade on the course.

Review assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (e.g. an A- to B+) for each calendar day (not class) that the assignment is overdue.

Review assignments may be given directly to the instructor in hard copy on the due date or submitted via the D2L Dropbox that will be provided. It is your responsibility to keep a copy of all assignments in case of loss by any cause.

All reading tests will receive a numerical grade out of 20, to be converted using the following scale:

Final grade calculations will be done using the letter grades and corresponding four-point scale.

Please note that, according to the University Calendar (F.1), instructors may use their discretion when rounding upwards or downwards when the average of term work and exams is between two letter grades.

Although the A+ is solely an honorific that entails no additional points in the 4-point system, the course instructor will employ this mark to distinguish superlative work that exceeds expectations in style, correctness, intellectual depth and breadth, sophistication, and originality.

Electronic devices: Electronic devices are allowed in class for note-taking etc., but are strictly forbidden during reading tests and the final examination. Accessing a device during a test or examination will be treated as an instance of academic misconduct.

Plagiarism:

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possible suspension or expulsion from the university. PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is an extremely serious offence. Please read the following information carefully. The penalty routinely recommended by the English Department for documented plagiarism is failure of the course in which the offence occurred; academic probation is also routinely applied at the Faculty level. Suspension or expulsion can result from severe or repeated plagiarism.

The University Calendar states:

1. Plagiarism - Essentially plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- (a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, or when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. Citing your sources in a bibliography is not enough, because a bibliography does not establish which parts of a student's work are taken from other sources. MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose. Advice on adequate documentation can be found at the following web sites:
